Screening for Success: Healthy Young Athletes Focus on Health and Wellness

On December 7, 2024, Dr. Erika Phelps-Nishiguchi of Hawaii Pacific Health led the second Healthy Young Athletes screening at the Young Athletes Annual Makahiki Pā'ani event. Vision, hearing, and developmental surveillance screenings were offered to children ages two to seven.

Healthy Young Athletes Clinical Director, Dr. Phelps-Nishiguchi was joined by volunteers from the Department of



Health's Early Intervention/Child Find & Children with Special Health Needs branch, the Hawaii Maternal & Child Health Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities program, students from the University of Hawaii Medical/Kinesiology & Rehabilitation Science department, and Mililani Mauka Elementary. Project Vision provided vision screenings, while Healthy Hearing Clinical Director Susan May of Kaiser Permanente and her audiology team conducted hearing screenings.

Parents received feedback and referrals

based on screening results and were given the opportunity to discuss questions/concerns regarding their child's health, development, and wellness. It was an informative and enjoyable day for both parents and keiki.

The next Healthy Athletes screenings will be at our Annual Medfest on February 11, 2025, at the Kaiser Permanente Mapunapuna Clinic. Medfest screenings will also be available on Maui, West Hawaii, and Kauai.
