What's Going On at Special Olympics Hawaii?

Unified Basketball Tournament Scores Big on Inclusion and Teamwork





Iolani High School was the site of an inspiring Unified Basketball tournament that brought together six teams from four elementary schools across Oahu. Teams from Ala Wai Elementary, Daniel K Inouye Elementary, Hahaione Elementary, and Pauoa Elementary gathered for a day filled with fun, teamwork, and friendly competition.

The tournament was held on Sunday, October 6, as part of the Oahu Area Regional Basketball Tournament. In total, 14 teams competed in the event, eight traditional Special Olympics teams, from five delegations; The Ducks, Na Ali'i, Pirates, Terminators, and Rainbows; along with the six unified teams representing the Unified Champion School Program.

"The joy and jubilation on the keiki's faces told it all," said Dale Arakaki, principal of Pauoa Elementary. "I was most impressed with the compassion that these players showed to each other and their opponents. The children shared the ball willingly and made sure everyone got a chance to shine. They unselfishly gave up the ball so others could shoot, and not just once, but many times. The competitive drive was there; however, it was overshadowed by the

sheer love they had for each other, making sure that each player had a chance to shine. A person who came to watch their niece play gave the ultimate compliment by saying, 'Your students played with heart and grace.' They were all so unselfish, kind to each other and their opponents, and very respectful."

In Division 1, Ala Wai Elementary claimed the championship title, while Pauoa Elementary won Division 2. Both teams displayed exceptional teamwork and skill throughout the tournament, embodying the event's spirit of camaraderie and inclusion.

Participants from Daniel K. Inouye Elementary also shared enthusiastic reflections on their experiences. Special Olympics athlete Nathan Loya exclaimed, "It was the best day of my life!" while Unified Partner Ashlynn Johnson added, "It was a great experience!" These are just a few examples of the positive feedback the tournament inspired.

This tournament exemplified the mission of the Unified Champion Schools program, fostering friendships, understanding, and unity through sports. It was a day to remember for all involved, celebrating the values of inclusion and kindness.

Garden Club Digs in with Fresh Activities for Fall


